1. Legislative Updates

The following bills are HTDC's admin bills or have significant impact on HTDC, and have been heard by at least one committee :

4. Hawai`i Small Business Capital Program (HI-CAP)

A. HICAP is in the process of completing the annual reporting data due to the Treasury by March 31, 2024.

5. INNOVATE Hawai'i (IH) Program

A. MAP held the Manufacturing Regional Visioning Workshop for Hawaii on February 6th to February 7th.



B. Both HSBIR and MAP programs have opened and closed their applications. They are currently in progress of reviewing applicants and putting together recommendations for the board.

6. Hawaii Center for Advanced Transportation Technology (HCATT) Program

- A. In November, HCATT and a small consortium applied for an Advanced Research Announcement (ARA) FA8650-18-S-5008/Government Requirement for Advanced Power and Energy (GRAPE) for \$9M; White Paper Title: Joint Base Pearl Harbor Hickam Sustainable Solar-Hydrogen Microgrid: Operational Energy Resilience and Advanced Prototype Testbed for the Joint Force. The concept of the proposal is to expand the PEARL microgrid beyond its current 1.5 MW capacity and develop into a robust solar hydrogen microgrid to further support energy resiliency requirements.
- B. The contract award date was February 2, 2024 and period of performance is 24 Months. GCC – Global Connective Center, the Prime, is a Delaware Limited Liability Company, a Service Disabled-Veteran Owned Small Business (SDVOSB) and has an operating address of 300 New Jersey Avenue, NW, Suite 900, Washington, DC 20001. HCATT as a subcontractor and will be coordinating with National Guard Bureau (NGB), Air Force Research Laboratory (AFRL) and Hawaii Air National Guard (HIANG) and other consortium members

7. Aerospace

- A. Progressing on aerospace infrastructure assessment and continuing meetings with various entities in public, private and institutional players throughout the State focusing on Maui, Hawaii, and Oahu.
- B. Aerospace Bill has passed Senate and House, with amendments to provide funding for a support position under the Aerospace Coordinator. Will be discussing adding some program budget to amendment to support Aerospace focused activities.
- C. Supporting projects relating to:
 - a. Unmanned Stratospheric Platforms testing, demonstration and operation from Hawaii with CAT LLC, SoftBank, and Aerovironment
 - b. Towed Launch Platform for launch services with existing infrastructure and minimal environmental impact with Fenix Aerospace,
 - c. Monitoring SeaGlider, a wing-in-ground effect vehicle designed to provide all-electric passenger and cargo services throughout the islands.

4. Executive Director's Report

Mr. Inouye provides an update on the activities performed in collaboration with the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT) in response to the Lahaina Fire. Ecommerce website training class will be launched to leverage the lack of in-person tourists to an online platform when the business community is ready. In a partnership with Amazon, a Made in Hawaii Marketplace focused on Maui will be created to build an online ecommerce platform. National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) Manufacturing Extension Program (MEP) has approved a disaster relief grant for manufacturers. The Department of Commerce is willing to allow a no match grant due to the Lahaina disaster site being Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) approved. The Innovate Hawaii program worked with Small Business Development Centers (SBDC) Wayne Wong on Maui to provide priority services to manufacturers or technology companies in need of consulting services or support.

Mr. Inouye briefs on the admin bills HTDC submitted for the 2024 legislative session. One bill relating to the research and development tax credit, which will move application process from time stamp to date stamp. Secondly, one bill relating to Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) and Manufacturing Development Grant Program to



amend the Phase 0 cap for awards from \$3,000 to \$6,000 as was suggested by the board.

Mr. Inouye states that a letter was received from the Governor's office stating that HTDC will receive \$6 million for core programs, but with commitments to use it with emphasis to support Maui recovery efforts. They are currently in the process of figuring what that looks like.

Mr. Wicker questions how much of the three core programs is distributed per county percentage wise.

Mr. Layugan briefs about his attendance at the PackExpo hosted in Las Vegas in partnership with Hawaii Food Manufacturers Association (HFMA).

Mr. Layugan briefs about his trip with Mr. Inouye to attend the Manufacturing Extension Partnership National Network Forum in Buffalo, New York.

Mr. Layugan states that Cindy Matsuki will be traveling to California to attend the FATHOMWERX Summit.

Mr. Molinaro provides an update on the Microgrid project and states that the plan is to start operating and testing at the end of October or beginning of November.

Mr. Inouye states that the four new positions for HTDC was approved and waiting to be released.

Mr. Wicker shares that each new positions need to be separately requested and that HTDC is asking to get the positions established to move forward with the hiring process.

5. Program Review

Mr. Layugan briefs on the Manufacturing Extension Partnership (MEP) and Manufacturing Assistance Program (MAP).

Mr. Sullivan questions what manufacturing looks like in Hawaii.

Mr. Layugan states that over 40% is food and beverages. If going off annual revenue, high tech companies that work with Department of Defense (DoD) or types of programs



such as Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) and Small Business Technology Transfer (STTR) are doing well.

Mr. Sullivan questions if SBIR and STTR counts as manufacturing.

Mr. Layugan states that SBIR and STTR fall into research and development that National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) accepts as manufacturing.

Mr. Kimura questions if there is a standardization of collecting data to figure out the priorities of manufacturing, and how is it captured quantitively and qualitatively.

Mr. Layugan states that for the federal program a quarterly survey is pushed out to ask about manufacturing variables and impacts from projects.

Mr. Wicker suggests that it would be helpful to provide more information regarding the data of Hawaii's manufacturing industry, so board members can provide input.

Mr. Sullivan questions how we are balancing growing the manufacturing industry, but also sustaining the manufacturing industry.

Mr. Wicker suggests outlining the processes and set targets for growing and sustaining the manufacturing industry.

Mr. Syrmos questions what percentage of the manufacturing is for commercialization purposes and what percentage is for research and development.

Mr. Kim questions what MEP and MAP is looking for in clients.

My. Layugan states that food and beverage does very well.

Mr. Wicker suggests focusing on capturing growth to present to legislators grow the program for manufacturers.

Ms. Fujiyama questions if there is still a time to increase the budget for the program.

3. Executive Directors Report

Wayne Inouye briefs on the Maui recovery efforts.

Ms. Kanemori states that they have been working with Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to lease about 800,000 square feet of space. This occupation could be for up to 2 years. They currently still have the Small Business Association (SBA) disaster recovery center there for about another 4 to 5 months.

Mr. Inouye asks Mr. Volner Jr. to share about the current climate of Maui.

Mr. Volner Jr. states that there are currently many different perspectives within Maui and as a company they are pleased to be participating in the clean up.

Mr. Gomez states that our request to fund the three core programs was not recommended by Budget and Finance therefore it was not in the Governor's budget. HTDC is currently working with legislators and clients to introduce a bill.

Mr. Wicker questions if there are any budget bills to fund the core programs in the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT) legislative package.

Mr. Gomez states that there are no budget bills in the DBEDT legislative package.

Mr. Wicker states that there is no First Responder Tech Campus (FRTC) update, and the advisory committee may be dissolved.

Mr. Hsi briefs on an update about the Hawaii Capital Assistance (HICAP) program, in the end of November, HTDC finalized an agreement with HATCH Accelerator Fund II to provide its full capital commitment of \$5 million through Tranche I of the State Small Business Credit Initiative (SSBCI) program. It is expected that the next venture fund capital commitment to be made to Mana Up Capital Fund II, which plans to launch its \$15-25 million fundraising effort in January 2024 (expected closing in June 2024). HTDC



plans to apply for Tranche II of the SSBCI program in early 2024, with a 4 to 6 months timeframe to receive the next allocation from the US Treasury.

Mr. Layugan states that the Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) application recently closed. The Manufacturing Assistance Program (MAP) application is opening in January and closing mid-February. Innovate Hawaii also hosted an annual review for the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) Manufacturing Extension Partnership (MEP). The next step is updating annual reports and paperwork, they should be seeing renewal within the next two years.

Mr. Molinaro states that the PEARL microgrid is targeting the first of March.

Mr. Gomez states that our Section 5 funding from the governor was released, equaling to \$2 million for each program. He clarifies that \$1.8 million is for the renewable energy microgrid project.

Mr. Inouye shares that HTDC will be focusing on collecting the right data and working with Research and Economic Analysis Division (READ) to fix the annual economic impact survey. They are working with TRUE initiatives to learn what the roadmap is.

4. Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT) Economic Strategy Presentation – Information only

Mr. Wicker presents on the strategic direction to diversify the economy, expand the economy, and grow the tax base. The goal is to build an economically sustainable Hawaii through innovation in agriculture and food production, green energy, and water reuse and conservation. The tactics to achieve this goal include strengthening current economic anchors, cultivating and growing emerging sectors, developing workforce and human capital, and building/updating economic foundations. Some specific strategies include curriculum to career, building infrastructure and facilities, policy changes, and layering incentives. Mr. Wicker highlights the aerospace economy and presents a brief timeline of milestones regarding topics such as aerospace and advanced manufacturing.

Mr. Volner Jr. asks if the state procurement system contains approved recruiting firms.

Chair asks for recommendations.

Mr. Syrmos states that they should do the RFP.

Mr. Inouye states that for the RFP, a scope of work and criteria is needed. The next step would be to post those materials on the State of Hawaii eProcurement system (HIePRO).

Mr. Barnabas suggests including criteria such as experience recruiting people in Hawaii and experience in sourcing relevant employee backgrounds.

Ms. Fujiyama questions if it is possible to put a time limit on recruiting firm.

Mr. Inouye states that it is possible.

Chair questions if it is the lowest bidder that will be awarded.

Mr. Inouye states yes, therefore, there needs to be a specific scope of work for recruiting firms to adhere to. There is also budget limitation as the payment would be coming out of HTDC's budget and he needs to confirm with Mr. Gomez how much HTDC can spend.

Mr. Barnabas suggests that HTDC staff draft the scope of works for board members to review.

Mr. Inouye agrees.

Chair asks for a motion to start a new executive director search and use a search firm.

Motion approved, 8/0. No testimony received.

Mr. Inouye states that the HIePRO is posted for a set amount of time and typically two weeks. They are looking into the first or second week of January.



Chair states that the next board meeting will be in February. He also states that he aims to have the board meetings every other month rather than every month.

Mr. Inouye states that he will check with Mr. Gomez about budget but needs to set a range to pay the recruiting firm.

Mr. Barnabas states that most firms charge 20% to 25% of the salary posted.

Mr. Syrmos questions if HTDC has leftover funds for Mr. Higashi's, former acting executive director, salary.

Mr. Syrmos suggests the range of \$50,000 to \$100,000 to employ the recruiting firm.

Mr. Wicker suggests checking the budget and salary savings, find what HTDC can go up to, and if plausible go up to \$100,000.

Chair asks for motion to give Mr. Inouye authority to do the RFP process under what was discussed and gain board approval.
